

Understanding Your Abnormal Mammogram Results

What does an abnormal result mean?

An abnormal result means you need more tests. About 7% of women who have a screening mammogram are asked to get more tests. Only a few women with abnormal results have breast cancer.

These are the common reasons for an abnormal result. They are not dangerous and are not cancer:

- Cysts (fluid-filled sacs)
- Fibroadenomas (small benign lesions that do not spread)
- Small calcium deposits

What are the additional tests?

Your extra tests depend on the type of abnormality that was found. These tests will help the healthcare provider rule out cancer or decide what the next steps should be.

Additional tests, in order from most to least common are:

- **Diagnostic mammogram:** This special x-ray of the breast gives more information than a screening mammogram.
- Clinical examination: Your healthcare provider examines your breasts for lumps, irritation, rash or dimpling.
- **Ultrasound**: A machine uses ultrasound waves to detect whether a breast lump is solid or fluid.
- **Biopsy:** A small sample of tissue is taken from the abnormal area for further study.



My doctor has recommended a biopsy – what should I expect?

Your doctor has recommended that you have a breast biopsy because an abnormality was discovered on your image. To determine if further treatment is necessary, your biopsy will provide your doctor with more answers.

Hugh Chatham Surgical offers different types of breast biopsies, including stereotactic and ultrasound guided biopsies. These are needle biopsies that are conducted on an outpatient basis and are non-scarring and non-surgical. You can go home shortly after the procedure.

Your best protection against breast cancer is early detection.
